

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1. VT-8 PILOT EDWARD "FRENCHIE" FAYLE (see the <u>February</u> newsletter)

2 February 2025 From: Don Velazquez California (Editor/publisher, *Heart Like a Mustang*)

I've pasted in a link [below] for an interview of Eddy "Frenchie" Fayle that was done several years ago. I'm gathering additional information on him for the BOM group. I've personally heard comments about him (from someone of VT-8 who did not fly) and read other comments here and there....you probably know of which I speak.



I thought it should be known that Fayle's 'questionable knife wound' could no way indicate his reluctance or fearfulness to fly in combat. Far from it. I think between the information my father gave in *Heart Like A Mustang*, Fayle's interview, and then Swede Larsen's own written recommendation for citation (Larsen witnessed Fayle's unescorted torpedo run), Fayle had quite the opposite of whatever some may have thought.

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2. THE B-26 TORPEDO ATTACK AT MIDWAY

An interesting video on the B-26 attack on the carriers at Midway. I admit I was surprised that it is of decent quality. Most are not worth the time to watch.

This leads to a question for our aviation experts. I had thought that the torpedo mounts on the B-26s were designed for the aircraft. The video claims they were jury-rigged. I had read somewhere that torpedo-carrying B-26s were used in at least one other attack during the war, though I have forgotten details. Can anyone confirm that the torpedo mounts were specially designed and not jury-rigged? Thanks.

Chuck has found us a pretty good BOM B-26 video. To give it a look, <u>click here</u>. There are several things in it that a Midway purist (like us) could readily quibble about—for example, notice the palm trees alongside Midway's runway as *Susie-Q* lands after the mission. But at least, the video is a whole lot better than the ridiculous B-26 sequence in the 2019 *Midway* movie.

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3. AKAGI PHOTO IN THE JANUARY NEWSLETTER

12 February 2025 From: Bill Longton Florida

The January BOMRT asked a question about the identification photo of the carrier *Akagi*. According to a book I have titled *The Darkest Hour: Vol 1* written by Michał A. Piegzik (ISBN 978-1-915070-61-6) that photo of the *Akagi* was taken on the morning of April 5, 1942 when she sailed in the Indian Ocean with Kido Butai to attack British installations on [Ceylon] (now Sri Lanka). The a/c on deck are Nakajima B5N2 "Kate" torpedo

bombers fitted out with 60kg bombs to attack land targets. The photo (page 28) credits the Naval History and Heritage Command.

The 2 volumes cover the Japanese attack up to and through the raids on Colombo and Trincomalee, including attacks on British shipping during that time. If you are interested in them, they are packed full of details for the nerds like me who enjoy that sort of thing. Highly recommended.

The Battle of Midway — colorized



In this familiar BOM photo the of USS *Hornet* (CV-8) on 4 June 1942, note Clay Fisher's SBD (yellow arrow) with the ship's chief photographer standing on the wing root, explaining the special camera mounted on the aircraft. As wingman for CDR Ring, Clay was supposed to snap photos of their dive on a target, which he told us would have been totally impossible. (They didn't dive on a target anyway, but that's a another story.)

As for the colorizing in this one, the *Hornet's* deck color looks more authentic than the images featured in recent newsletters. And like the others, the color of just about everything else looks quite real.
